

The dream of a local hospital became a reality when Decatur County Memorial Hospital opened its doors in 1922 at its current location. The muchanticipated, county-owned facility was built as a memorial to Decatur County residents who fought and died for our country in World War I.

As the community and healthcare services continue to grow, multiple additions to buildings and services have occurred. DCMH always remembers, however, their true mission to the community and why they opened their doors in 1922.

Although located in a small town, the care and spirit the hospital brings equals that of a major city hospital. DCMH pushes the boundaries of health care and hopes to grow today and tomorrow to better serve this community.

Mayher Ahmad, MD, is a hospitalist at DCMH, providing compassionate, quality care to every patient.



Construction of a new DCMH Rehab Facility and Medical Office Building began in 2022 with a groundbreaking ceremony

DCMH EXPANSION CONTINUES

This remarkable new addition, set to open in 2023, will house a state-of-the-art rehabilitation facility, including physical therapy, speech therapy, cardiac rehab, and pulmonary rehab services. In addition, it will include an orthopedic clinic with an onsite x-ray, a foot/ankle clinic, and exam rooms for primary care, internal medicine, and specialty care. The tremendous work of the rehabilitation services team will only continue to grow at this new facility.

"As we continue to strive to be among the very best hospitals in the nation, we focus on what will make the most positive impact on our community and surrounding areas. Having access to this facility and services close to home is going to make a tremendous difference in the lives of those we serve," said President/CEO Rex McKinney.

Some of the event's dignitaries of note at the groundbreaking included Rex McKinney, President/CEO of DCMH, N. Anjum Fazlani, M.D., doctor of internal medicine and medical director of Rehab Services, Mieasha Barksdale, M.D., foot and ankle surgeon, and Larry Rueff, Board of Trustees Chairperson. In addition, the DCMH Board of Trustees, the Hospital Foundation Board of Directors, the rehabilitation services team, and other key stakeholders participated in this ceremony.



A CENTURY OF CARE





On February 4, 1922, DCMH opened its doors as a memorial to those Decatur County residents who fought and died in World War I. Originally constructed as a 16,000-square-foot facility at the current location, DCMH today spans multiple locations and patient-centric services from surgery and a women's center to a robust rehabilitation center and virtual care.

DCMH hosted various events during 2022 to reflect on the 100th anniversary.

Among those events:

- February Unveiling of a history wall featuring a timeline and historical artifacts
- March Marking National Nutrition Month with the construction of a "100" out of canned food items and subsequently donating those non-perishable items to Greensburg Bread of Life
- April Participating in the Community Clean-Up Challenge in conjunction with Decatur County Recycling
- May 14 A community-wide Centennial Celebration marked by an official ceremony and the release of a book detailing DCMH history
- July Fourth of July Parade festivities and partnering with Greensburg Parks & Recreation to sponsor community fireworks
- August 6 Hosting a Community Pool Party, DCMH donated \$2 to the Decatur County Animal Shelter for every person in attendance.
- December Holiday Lane celebrated long-tenured employees, with 700+ in attendance

DCMH President/CEO Rex McKinney stated, "I have had the privilege of leading this staff of healthcare professionals for nearly five years. Because of their effort and dedication to providing exceptional quality of care to our community, DCMH is rated among the top 10% of hospitals in the entire country and the top 7% in the State of Indiana. That quality of care is what our community has come to expect and certainly deserves."

DCMH HISTORY


The DCMH story begins in 1918 – four years before opening its doors. After several attempts, citizens Dr. D. W. Weaver, Sam Bonner, Dr. I. M. Sanders, and John F. Russell finally convinced the county commissioners of the need for a hospital to serve Decatur County. As the Spanish Flu pandemic raged and infant mortality increased due to inadequate healthcare access in the rural area, the commissioners agreed to propose a \$100,000 bond issue toward establishing a county hospital. Local churches, Sunday schools, lodges, sororities, clubs, and individuals raised an additional \$5,076. In honor of the local veterans who served in World War I, the name "Decatur County Memorial Hospital" was selected.

During its first year, 65 patients were admitted. Notably, the hospital performed surgeries and general inpatient care and even delivered eight newborns. As admissions and need for care increased, a small building expansion added two private patient rooms and public area sun parlors in 1927. A dozen years later, a \$100,000 expansion was partially covered by the federal government's Public Works Administration (PWA) as healthcare advancements like the development of penicillin and a vaccine for yellow fever extended the patients' lives

Scientific developments like these were the impetus for the change of perception in modern hospitals. While the hospital of the 1800s was a place to go to be sick, the 20th-century hospital evolved into a "line of first defense," that resulted in cures and a return home. While the country would still face significant healthcare challenges – like the polio epidemic – infant mortality dropped, and life expectancy increased.

Medical and technological advancements too numerous to detail set the scene for further expansions and significant additions, like an expanded pediatric wing and obstetric wards, the Cancer Center, a Med/Surg unit, and an Advanced Care Unit. Most recently, and perhaps one of the most significant milestones in the hospital's history, DCMH was named among the top hospitals nationwide.

HEALTHCONNECT OPENS!

DCMH HealthConnect opened its doors on July 11 at the Decatur County Family YMCA campus – yet another way DCMH continues to provide the Quality Care You Want, Close By.

HealthConnect is open three days a week for massage therapy, Phase 3 Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab, and monitoring participants' weight, blood sugar, and blood pressure. DCMH continues to provide additional services at HealthConnect, including event meeting space, Spirit of Women events, Lunch & Learns, and diabetes and nutrition-focused programs.

The opening of this facility is yet another example of community collaboration supporting the mission and growth of DCMH.



AWARDS

DCMH RECOGNIZED FOR SEPSIS TREATMENT

Decatur County Memorial Hospital was recently honored as a Top 10% Hospital for Sepsis Bundle Compliance by the Indiana Hospital Association (IHA).

Sepsis is a life-threatening response of the body to infection. According to the IHA, over 4,800 hospitalized patients died from sepsis in Indiana in 2021 (Indiana Hospital Association, 2022).

Sepsis can occur from any infection and can be challenging to diagnose. Sepsis can affect anyone with an infection. The main types of infections often linked with sepsis are lungs (pneumonia), kidney (urinary tract infection), skin (new or worsening injury), and abdomen.

A bundle refers to any collection of interventions that significantly improve patient outcomes when done as a whole. The sepsis bundle is a collection of tests and treatments that help identify and treat the infection. The goal is to catch sepsis early and initiate treatment before it causes significant organ damage.

Thanks to the work of our outstanding team members, the IHA recognized DCMH for its efforts, which also improved the state's overall performance.



PHYSICIAN NAMED PRECEPTOR OF THE YEAR

Nicole Boersma, M.D., a DCMH primary care provider specializing in Family Medicine and Obstetrics, was named Preceptor of the Year by the East Indiana Area Health Education Center.

Dr. Boersma supervises student physicians as a preceptor as they acquire clinical medical knowledge by helping care for real patients.

Dr. Boersma has been an active preceptor for the IU School of Medicine for several years and continuously goes above and beyond to make students feel welcome and part of the DCMH team. She provides excellent clinical knowledge, helps students build relationships with patients and families, and teaches through example. Dr. Boersma also helps immerse students in the community and facilitates connections by inviting students to participate in community events.

INSPIRE HOSPITAL OF DISTINCTION

The DCMH Women's Center/OB department earned the 2022 INspire Hospital of Distinction award from the Indiana Hospital Association.

Recognized as a 2022 Top 100 Critical Access Hospital, Decatur County Memorial Hospital proudly serves patients as the only critical access hospital in the state of Indiana to receive this award.

Compiled by The Chartis Center for Rural Health, this annual recognition program honors outstanding performance among the nation's rural hospitals based on the results of the Chartis Rural Hospital Performance INDEX[™].

"Being recognized as one of the Top 100 Critical Access Hospitals in the nation is a testament to the dedication of our entire team," said Rex McKinney, President/CEO of Decatur County Memorial Hospital. "Our team is committed to providing exceptional quality care and serving our community. Being recognized nationally is an honor our entire team is proud of."

The Top 100 Critical Access Hospital list uses the Chartis Group's Performance INDEX[™] to objectively evaluate 36 rural-relevant indicators from publicly available datasets across eight pillars of performance, including quality, outcomes, inpatient/outpatient market share, financials, and patient perspectives. The top performers on this list, including DCMH, excel in managing risk, securing better outcomes, increasing patient satisfaction, and operating at a lower cost than their peers.




